Survey Results

A while ago the IGA sent out a survey to learn about our members and get their opinions about which of our services they value most.

We received 61 responses from 30 different countries.

One of the questions that we asked was, "What is your area of expertise?" Most of the members who responded to the survey are involved in multiple forms of research. 29 of the 61 survey respondents said that dairy goat research was one of their areas of expertise. Researching teaching and extension was second with 24 of 61.

Time

Your poster will be on display from June 27 and 28 until 9 o'clock pm. Posters must be removed on June 29 after the closing of the conference. Make sure to remove all poster materials from the board. The conference staff will remove posters not taken down by Sunday June 30, at 9 o'clock.

Poster Board and Material

The maximum size of your poster should be 0.90 m width and 1.10 m height. Your poster number will be displayed with large printed figures in the upper corner of the poster board. Your poster material should be attached on the surface, using all types of fastening set forth by the organizers. The following guidelines include information about the technical facilities of the conference venue, instructions for different types of presentations, delivery of presentation materials, and some advice as regards preparation of slides, posters and papers. After registration you should go to the Commission Desks where you should register your presence as a presenter and where you will be given further instructions. The information below will help you prepare for the meeting.

Technical information

Three conference rooms will be equipped with LCD projectors for video and computer display and a stationary computer, an overhead projector (OHP). Some rooms will have audio systems for microphones.

Power Point presentations

The computers are PCs with Intel processors using Microsoft Windows XP Pro and Office XP – there is no Macintosh available. All presentations will be copied onto a central conference presentation-server to ensure quick upload in the lecture rooms. The presentation software is Power Point XP. Older versions of Power Point will be compatible. Authors should bring the Power Point presentation file on USB memory stick, CD or diskette. Each presentation will be tested and loaded onto a PC after verification. Authors are requested to submit an advance copy of the presentation a week before leaving home to ensure that the presentation isn't corrupt in any way. Updating on arrival is always an option. The presentations can be received as e-mail attachments (split in parts if the presentation is large), CD, floppy disc (limited space) and DVD. If you e-mail your presentation, please send it to the following address: iga2006@caprirom.ro and secretariat@caprirom.ro A preview room will be available during the entire conference with two PC computers in attendance to upload presentations or help with updating presentations already installed on the server. Please test and if necessary revise the computer presentation at least one day ahead of your oral presentation.

• 6th International Sheep Veterinary Congress, Greece, 17-21 June 2005

The 6th International Sheep Veterinary Congress took place in Hersonnisos, Crete, Greece from the 17th to the 21st June 2005 and was hosted by the Hellenic Veterinary Medical Society. An Organizing Committee under the chairmanship of Dr. George C. Fthenakis and an International Scientific Committee under the chairmanship of Professor Quintin A. McKellar were responsible for all issues of the Congress.

Veterinarians and other scientists from around the world and active in sheep research and practice, gathered and attended the world's only international scientific event, dedicated to Sheep Health and Production. There was a general consensus that the meeting was an outstanding success. The importance of sheep in the socio-economic framework in countries around the world was succinctly stated during the Congress; the contribution of veterinarians was also underlined.

The theme of the Congress, "Sustaining Sheep Health and Production: From Conception to Consumption," embraced the long-standing tradition of sheep medicine with the recent advances in the field and covered the whole spectrum of scientific issues related to Sheep Health and Production. Colleagues working in Sheep Health and Production from many countries of the world contributed by submitting papers, thus ensuring the continuous exchange of ideas between all with an interest in the field. With an attendance of 680 participants from 35 countries of the world and the presentation of 223 papers, the 6th ISVC was the largest ever Congress of the series.

During two round tables that were held at the Congress, the following two special resolutions were proposed and adopted unanimously by the delegates.

1. <u>Veterinary Drugs for Sheep</u>: "The regulatory authorities throughout the world are encouraged to introduce flexible approaches to the authorization of medicines for sheep, thus supporting their health and welfare, but without compromising consumer or environmental safety."

- 2. <u>Specialization in Sheep Health and Production</u>: "A founding committee was authorized to make a formal application to the European Board of Veterinary Specialization and to undertake the initiating work required for the establishment of a new specialist group for veterinarians to be known as the *European College of Small Ruminant Health and Production*."

A special issue of *Small Ruminant Research*, including the keynote lectures presented at the Congress will be published in the near future.

The 7th ISVC is scheduled for 12 to 16 June 2009 and will take place in Stavanger, Norway.

Latest IGA News and Activities from Mexico

We have made a great deal of progress organizing the 9th International Conference on Goats, 2008 in the first year 2005 in Mexico. The National Autonomous University of Mexico, the largest university in Mexico, has officially agreed to host the 9th ICG 2008 conference. We have also visited Can Cun twice to start the arrangements for the conference and hired a Total Congress Organizer to coordinate the work.

This year we have helped to organize five events in Mexico to promote the International Goat Association.

- In May, Dr. Fidel Periacote taught a course in Queretaro, "Goat management with improved technology and genetic planning." We also attended a goat seminar on nutrition organized by the National Association of Animal Nutritionists where Dr. Pierre Morand-Fehr was the main speaker.
- Later we had a course in Mexico City at the National Autonomous University of Mexico, "Probiotics & Prebiotics and goat management and disease."
- We will have a course on "Health products from goats a progressing industry" in the National Institution of Human Nutrition in October.
- In November, we will have a course in Monterrey organized by Dr. Jorge Kawas on "Goat nutrition in the pasture."
- At the end of the year we will have the first encounter between scientists dedicated to goat research and goat producers which will take place in Queretaro during the National Meeting of goat producers.

We have also participated in the formation of the National Association of goat producers (COMECAPRI), Dr. Francisco Gurria, Chairman. COMECAPRI will also participate in ICG 2008.

In addition, the IGA's 2006 calendar should be ready in December.

• A Report of the Farm Production Seminar, Czech Republic

The one day international seminar for farmers and experts titled "Farm production of cheeses and fermented milk products II" was held on Mendel's Agricultural and Forestry University in Brno (MAFU) in the Czech Republic on July 7, 2005. The main seminar topic was milk cheese-making and milk microbiology at farm milk processing.

Paper topics included;

- Processing cow, sheep and goat milk in the Czech Republic,
- Cheese-making and rennet,
- Raw milk microbiology and hygiene quality,
- Utilization of pure cheese microbial cultures for farm cheese-making,
- Nitrogen matter distribution in milk and their importance for cheese-making,
- Relationship of protected proteins in ruminant nutrition and higher milk yield.

In the afternoon, a professional and public tasting of goat, sheep and cow cheeses produced directly on farms was held. These cheeses came from Czech Republic, Slovak Republic, Germany and Austria. The results will be evaluated.

• A Brief about Goat Production in Uganda

The goat population and breeds in Uganda

In Uganda, estimates indicate that there are about 6.8 million goats in Uganda (data from Small Ruminant study report 1999). No census of livestock has taken place in the recent past, the last one having been done in 1991.

These goats are mainly of indigenous breeds, namely Mubende, Kigezi and Small East African.

A few goat breeds from the region, southern Africa and United Kingdom have been introduced in the country but in very small populations. The characteristics of the goat breeds compared to the local breeds are shown in table 1.

International small ruminant scientific conference in Slovak Republic, October 2005

An international scientific conference, "Ecological and economic aspects in utilization of agricultural disadvantageous areas by breeding of small ruminants" will be held in the Slovak Republic from October 18 to 20, 2005. The conference will be located in the picturesque Slovak mountains, Mala Fatra in Vratna dolina at the Boboty hotel, and has been organized with the support of the Dairy Research Institute in Zilina and the Austrian Information Center for scientific co-operation ASO.

This conference will be a first of its kind in the Central European region in which member countries of EU as well as non-members will participate.

During the conference there will be opportunities to learn more about the state of sheep and goat breeding in various Central European countries. The conference also offers the possibility of mutual exchange of information on manufacture praxis, control authorities and research stations after the integration of most of the Central European countries into the EU.

The goat population and breeds in Uganda

The year of June 2004 to June 2005 was a very important one for the development of goat breeding in Romania and the growth of Caprirom.

With 13 years of experience the Caprirom Association is a valuable partner for goat breeding farmers of Romania.

During this time period, the number of the Caprirom members increased from 500 to 610 and the number of regional branches increased from 3 to 13, so that the Caprirom network covers most of the country. Also, the number of goats owned by Caprirom is over 30,000 heads, which represents 5% from the total livestock of goats in Romania, which at this moment is 750,000 heads out of which 510,000 are reproduction goats.

• Comparison among goat, sheep and cow milk, Czech Republic

Introduction

During the last fifteen years, there has been a reduction of agricultural activity in the Czech Republic and this has created problems in some of the less favorable regions.

As it is commonly known, one way to promote economic prosperity and utilize such regions is to raise small ruminants in an environmentally-friendly fashion. There is a growing understanding of the important nutritional value of so called "alternative milk," e.g. goat milk, especially for people who are more susceptible to illness in terms of their specific nutrition and metabolic demands.

This article presents the preliminary results of a study on goat milk composition under farm conditions.
